



In the ever-evolving landscape of international diplomacy, India stands as a beacon of progress and potential. With its burgeoning economy, diverse population, and steadfast commitment to peacekeeping efforts, India has emerged as a prominent player on the world stage. Yet, despite its undeniable contributions to global stability, India finds itself on the outside looking in when it comes to one of the most crucial bodies in international affairs: the United Nations Security Council (UNSC).

Established in 1945, the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) is one of the five principal organs of the United Nations, charged with the maintenance of international peace and security as well as accepting new members to the United 14 Nations and approving any changes to UN Charter.

Functions and powers of United Nations Security Council:

- The most important function of the UNSC is maintaining peace and security at the international level.
- Apart from maintaining peace, the Security Council can also deploy UN peacekeeping operations and impose sanctions on states.
- The UNSC can also impose diplomatic relations severance, financial restrictions and penalties, blockades and even collective military action if required.

UNSC Members

There are permanent and non-permanent members of the UNSC.

- A total of 15 members are there in the council, out of which 5 are permanent and 10 are not permanent.
- The five permanent members include China, France, the Russia, the United Kingdom, and the United States of America.
- The 10 non-permanent members are Albania, Brazil, Gabon, Ghana, India, Ireland, Kenya, Mexico, Norway and United Arab Emirates. The nonpermanent members are elceted for two-year terms by the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA)

The most important power or I rather say the director power is the VETO. So, basically the meaning of VETO is "Latin of 'I Forbid'".

Let us take a hypothetical example to understand what VETO really is:

Due to the extreme human rights violation Uyghur Muslim population USA rafts a resolution for an enquiry in this matter. Now to adopt a draft resolution, none of the permanent members should VETO it and 9 non-permanent members should vote in favor. So just in case all the 10 non-permanent members vote in favor and the 4 permanent members also does not VETO the resolution, do you think that China will VETO or Not. Absolutely they will VETO the draft resolution, now that's how democratic the UNSC is!

This VETO power is used by all the permanent members-

- China and Russia have VETOed four draft resolutions on Syria since 2019.
- The U.S has used its VETO right 42 times for Israel simce 1972
- Palestine has not become a UN member, as full membership requires UNSC approval.
- China blocks Taiwan's UN membership, not recognizing Taiwan as a sovereign country
- And recently China and Russia VETO a draft resolution filed by US for complete ceasefire on Israel-Hamas War.

No representation from Africa, South America

As such the UNSC has no representation from the continents like Africa, South America and Australia and very less representation from Asia. Now we have to ask a simple question do these five countries use their VETO powers in the interest of the world or their national interest.

<u>Road Blocks in India's bid for Permanent</u> <u>Membership</u>:

- It is argued by critics that Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) and also refused to sign the Comprehensive Nuclear Test-Ban Treaty in 1996.
- China, which has VETO power in the UNSC, has been stonewalling India's efforts to become a permanent member.

Now the question arises why not India if not India?

- India sends the largest deployment as UN peacekeeping force which comes under UNSC.
- We are and will always be the largest democracy in the world.
- We are the country with the greatest number of people 1.41 billion or 17.76% of world population.
- We are the fifth largest economy in the world. India have been always in the forefront in helping our neighbours and the world as such. With sending vaccines, operation Dost and all.



Key committees and their agendas included: United Nations Security Council (UNSC): The UNSC meeting's agenda was centred on evaluating the hazards associated with the existing climate and critically examining the plans for enacting new climate control policies. from the delegates and the Chairs, members of the press were present in the committees.




