



Profile of the Research Facilitator



Dr Oliver Nelson Gonsalves is the Research Facilitator and, since August 2022, heads the Incubation Centre at St Edmund's College, Shillong. The Incubation Centre is designed to accelerate the publication of the college's faculty and students and organise Value-Added Courses (VACs) and Add-On Courses (ACs) to familiarise them with the ecosystem of research.

Dr Gonsalves holds a PhD in Energy Studies from the Energy Studies

Programme, School of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), New Delhi. He also has an MA in International Relations and an MPhil in Chinese Studies from JNU. He has acquired more than six years of professional experience in research, business-intelligence, publishing and teaching.

He was formerly a *Visiting Research Fellow* at the Azerbaijan Diplomatic Academy (ADA University), Baku (2017) and a recipient of the prestigious *Maulana Azad National Fellowship* (2013-18). China's Ministry of Commerce also invited him to China as a delegate for a two-month Mandarin course in 2014. Dr Gonsalves is a Reviewer for two Scopus-indexed journals (*Australian Journal of Maritime & Ocean Affairs* and *Renewable and Sustainable Energy Reviews*).

As Research Fellow and Head of the Maritime Energy-Security and Security-of-Energy (MESSE) Cluster at the National Maritime Foundation (NMF), New Delhi, he led the NMF's study of the maritime facets of energy, with a focus on energy geopolitics (2019-2022). He also served as the Executive Editor of *Maritime Affairs: Journal of the National Maritime Foundation of India*, a Scopus-indexed and UGC-CARE-listed journal. He continues to engage with the NMF as an Honorary Adjunct Fellow.

His areas of interest include studying qualitative research methods, energy geopolitics, sustainability, and various issues unique to India's Northeast.

Research Facilitator's message

India's National Education Policy 2020 (NEP 2020) — which overhauled a thirty-five-year-old policy and introduced qualitative changes to higher education in India — advances "holistic development" and "multidisciplinarity" in Higher Education Institutions (HEIs). It identified two significant challenges (among others) to higher education in India. First, the "development of cognitive skills and learning outcomes" is ignored, and second, it flags the absence of *research* in HEIs.

St Edmund's understands that developing a passion for research among the college's faculty and students could kindle analytical skills among stakeholders, enabling them to face the challenges of the Digital Age.

To this end, St Edmund's College, Shillong, established the Incubation Centre. The Incubation Centre is a first-of-its-kind initiative by an undergraduate college in Meghalaya. It is geared toward accelerating peer-reviewed and ethical publications, primarily in the college's Arts stream. In the two years since its establishment, the Incubation Centre has had slow — but steady — success. This Integrated Annual Report is a testament to student and faculty achievements in research. It outlines the courses undertaken for the students and the guidance and mentorship provided to faculty and students. A special highlight of this report is the success of the Incubation Centre's Plagiarism Check initiative. It is a perfect example of the college's intrepidity in pushing curricular limits to skill students in academic writing and adopting contemporary ethical academic practices.

The Incubation Centre attributes its success to the enthusiasm shown by the college administration, the teaching faculty and the students and thanks them all.

Creating Impact


This section depicts the Incubation Centre's initiatives since its establishment in August 2022. Although the Centre is independent of departments under the four primary streams (Arts, Commerce, Science and Professional courses), its activities are meticulously coordinated with their schedules. Knowledge of the latest qualitative research methods and an intimate understanding of the ecosystem of research, including publications and exposure to job-relevant skills, anchor the motivation for the Centre's three initiatives. These initiatives are discussed in the following sections below.

Value-Added Courses (VACs) and Add-on Courses (ACs)

Value-Added Courses (VACs) were introduced to enhance the theoretical knowledge imparted by regular courses. Following the introduction of the National Education Policy (NEP 2020) syllabus, Value-Added Courses were renamed Add-on Courses (ACs) in July 2023. The Incubation Centre's courses are designed to be job-relevant and conversant with the latest qualitative research methods. These courses are non-credit. These courses are:

- ✤ Academic Writing and Understanding the Ecosystem of Research
- Research Methodology
- Developing Soft Skills: Communication and Critical Thinking (now renamed as Navigating Modern Workplaces)

Eight courses have been organised since August 2022. **Table 1** (below) gives the departmentwise breakdown of courses conducted by the Incubation Centre and mentions the dates on which these courses were taught.

ACs are conducted over 36 hours (including assignment assessment). Most courses were conducted in hybrid mode.




Figure 1: Success rate of participants in various courses organised by the Incubation Centre

Moving to the mode of evaluation, only students who scored a minimum of 40% and above are deemed successful and are, thereby, eligible for certificates. **Figure 1** (below) shows that **56.52%** of the participants have met this requirement.

External subject-matter experts conduct a few modules unfamiliar to the Research Facilitator. These sessions may be offline or online, depending on the availability of the expert in Shillong. Further, feedback (through Google Forms) is sought from the students on the course's conduct. Responses are incorporated into the report and, more importantly, followed through. For instance, one of the participants, who had attended the VAC with the Department of Political Science in April 2023, suggested the circulation of reading material in advance. This practice was adopted in all following VACs.

In addition to these courses, the Centre also assists other departments in the organisation of their independent ACs. For instance, the Department of Khasi organised a VAC entitled *Khasi for Everyday Life* in May 2023. The Research Facilitator assisted the department's teaching faculty with planning various modules and preparing the report and certificates.

Similarly, the Research Facilitator conducted one module on Research Outputs with the students of the Department of Sociology. This two-hour module was part of the eight-day AC on *Basic Concepts of Social Research*, held between 15-23 March 2023. This module was so well-received by the students that in the following year, the Incubation Centre's engagement in the same course was increased to two two-hour long sessions with the 6th-semester students of Sociology.

In May 2024, the Research Facilitator was invited as a Resource Person by the Department of Social Work (Postgraduate), St Edmund's College, Shillong, to conduct a day-long workshop (15 May 2024) on *Review of Literature and Referencing* (**Image 1**). Since the 2nd semester students of the department are expected to write a dissertation, the workshop was extended for another day to familiarise them with what to expect while writing their dissertation.

One of the fourth-semester students (Siddhant Senapati, 4th semester, MSW) is interacting with the Research Facilitator to improve the quality of his dissertation.

Reports of all ACs and any collaborative efforts are forwarded to the IQAC Coordinator, the Vice Principal (Academics), the concerned Head of the Department and Dr Samrat Adhikari, Head, Department of Biotechnology and in-charge of the preparation of the college's Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR). These reports are also available on the college's website (https://sec.edu.in/incubation.php).

Student Engagement

Another initiative the Incubation Centre took is advancing research among students. The Research Facilitator mentors students to pursue research by encouraging them to review non-fiction academic books for journals. This initiative is promoted at all VACs as an independent student-oriented initiative where student researchers are trained to write in academically-acceptable language, analyse complex arguments and simplify them, make logically sound arguments, and acquaint themselves with the publication process.

Some of the features of this initiative are listed below:

- Students are encouraged to write book reviews only
- Students must propose works of non-fiction only
- Manuscripts are only sent to Scopus-indexed journals
- Relaxed submission deadlines; self-paced work
- Full authorship (and any remuneration by the journal) to the students





Figure 2: Intake of student researchers by the Incubation Centre

The emphasis on book reviews instead of research articles stems from existing capacity shortcomings. Currently, students need to be more trained in contemporary research practices as these are outside the recommended syllabus by North-Eastern Hill University (NEHU). Moreover, the VAC/AC conducted by the Incubation Centre comprises introductory modules spread over only 36 hours.

Figure 2 (above) shows the intake of student researchers. Although it shows a minute increase, the Centre is optimistic about this effort's acceptance as an integral aspect of students' capabilityenhancement. Due to the novelty of this enterprise, the college has not created a formal mechanism for recognising student researchers. However, this process is underway. St Edmund's College recognises the significance of publications in developing cognitive abilities and the broader impact such initiatives can have on morale and the dissemination of knowledge among students and teachers. The Incubation Centre has tasted early success in this initiative by publishing Krishna Sharma's book review in a Scopus-indexed and UGC-CARE-recognised journal (refer to **Table 2** below for more details). This is a first for a student from the Arts faculty in the history of this college. Image 2 (below) is one part (a PowerPoint presentation detailing Krishna's journey was also circulated on the college's Digi noticeboard) of the marketing campaign publicising Krishna's novel achievement.

St. Edmund's College, Shillong, congratulates Krishna Sharma on publishing her review of Chris Miller's book, Chip War: The Fight for the World's Most Critical Technology (Simon & Schuster Publishers, London). The following section will discuss the college's ground-breaking Plagiarism Check Initiative.

Promoting Best Practices — Plagiarism Check Initiative

This section outlines the College's internal process for generating plagiarism reports. It was developed in March 2023 after a discussion between five heads of various departments at the Department of Biotechnology. The Research Facilitator was designated as the point of contact for generating plagiarism reports.

Image 3 (above) shows the first page (of a six-page report) of a plagiarism check for a document submitted in March 2024. The software also provides users with suggestions to improve grammar and other writing-related issues. It also shows the percentage of plagiarism (4%). **The College has fixed 20% as the threshold for similarity**.

Figure 3 (below) depicts the implementation of St. Edmunds' Plagiarism Check Initiative. The research facilitator generates a plagiarism report and e-mails it to the students (keeping her supervisor in Cc) within three days of receiving the request.




Figure 3: Flow chart of the implementation of St Edmunds' Plagiarism Check Initiative

Although the report is detailed and could cover several pages, only the first three pages are forwarded if the threshold is not breached. However, if a student exceeds the 20% threshold, she (and her supervisor) is e-mailed the comprehensive plagiarism report and directed to rewrite her original submission. Project/field reports unaccompanied by a plagiarism report from the Incubation Centre are excluded from end-semester assessments.

Since May 2023, the **Incubation Centre has processed 141 plagiarism reports**. Figure 4 (below) depicts the department-wise breakdown of these reports. This indicates that, so far, seven out of the twenty-two departments of St. Edmund's College are participating in this initiative.

So far, only five departments (Computer Applications, Biotechnology, Computer Science, Environmental Studies and Chemistry) have endorsed this process by forwarding student assignments for review by the plagiarism software. Documents from the Post Graduate Department of Social Work (Social Work [PG] in Figure 4), the Department of Physics and the Department of Economics comprised individual academic pursuits for submission to publishing houses (for book chapters) and various Scopus-indexed journals.





Figure 5 (below) shows the various categories of documents forwarded to the Incubation Centre for plagiarism checks. Four departments alone account for the 77 project reports submitted (Computer Applications, Computer Science, Environmental Studies, and Chemistry). The Department of Biotechnology sought to evaluate field trip reports only.



The following section outlines the near-term objectives of the Incubation Centre in the academic year 2024-25.

Outlook for the Future

St. Edmund's College, Shillong, has kept up with the latest developments in education. This initiative has shown that a primarily undergraduate college is ahead of the curve and attempting to expose its students to global ethical research and learning standards.

Therefore, it is essential to keep the momentum going by setting near-term objectives for the continued success of this initiative. Increased interaction with faculty and students for the publication of their work is evidence of the success of this fledgling enterprise. Having tasted success in the pursuit of its previous goals, the Incubation Centre is resolved to maintain its consistency in achieving the following objectives:

- ◆ Expand the participation of the college's departments in the Plagiarism Check Initiative
- ◆ Increase student engagement in the college's research-oriented pursuits
- ◆ Publication of at least two works by the Research Facilitator
