The program commenced with the welcome address by Prof. Sumit Deb, IQAC Coordinator where he underlined the significance of the practice of Yoga which can promote the holistic health of every individual. The instructor then took over and talked about the history of yoga. She also explained the different benefits of practicing yoga on a daily basis. The Yoga instructor also informed students not to force one to do all the different postured but understand your own level of flexibility.

The theme of this festival is "Empowering Youth for HIV & Stigma Free Society". As the theme stated, this festival aims at harnessing the potential of the youth by equipping with them the correct information on HIV/AIDS Prevention, care and support.

Various competition and activities were held in the event like bike rally, intercollege debate, extempore speech, chart and face painting, photography, slang poetry, B-boying, beatbox and popping contest, e-sports, street play competition and other informal programs.

The NSS unit of St. Edmund's College was given the initiative of conducting the street play as one of the activities of the festival. Through this interaction and visit, the residents expressed their great joys for the company of the volunteers and the Digonto group members.



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Learning Outcome: The visit to the Shanti Bhavan was a good experience as the volunteer gets to connect with old and destitute from every corner of the state. The NSS Unit of St. Edmund's college conducted a Vermicomposting Training Programme for the volunteers at the Department of Environmental Science, St. Edmund's College on the 1st of September, 2022. NSS Programme Officer, Mr. E. Sumer, was the resource person, and a total of 30 NSS volunteers participated in the training programme.

The programme commenced with a talk on the meaning, importance and benefits of Vermicomposting that can be used by the local people in the community. This was followed by a presentation on Vermicomposting by the resource person which can be understood as 'an organic and biological process in which earthworm species are primarily used to convert organic matter or biodegradable wastes into manure'. Its benefits include improvement in the physical, chemical and biological quality of soil, and enhancement of soil fertility. Vermicompost-treated soil has better aeration, porosity, bulk density and water retention.

The second part of the training took place in the vermicomposting area, where the volunteers were shown a vermicompost unit, and were given explanation on vermicompost preparation, practice and management. The students were then further taught about using simple steps on how to make such compost at home.



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The third part of the training is the question-and-answer session, where volunteers got to clarify their doubts and ask question from the resource person. The session ended with the resource person sharing tips for using this compost and to try it out at home.







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Learning Outcomes: NSS is associated with volunteers, working and learning along with the community. Therefore, this training on preparation and benefits of Vermicomposting taught the students about the simple method of making the compost, even at home. Through the training, the volunteers can bring their learning into practice once they start working in the community, through the programmes and special camps.

National Nutritional week is observed annually from 1-7 September. As an observance of the National Nutritional Week, the NSS unit of St. Edmund's College conducted a one-day Awareness Campaign at Mylliem Mawsawa and Mylliem Rngi on the 2nd of September, 2022.

The volunteers divided into two groups conduct the Awareness Campaign in two different schools, namely: Mawsawa LP School and Rngi LP School. An ice breaking game and exercise was conducted before the awareness program. The campaign was merely an awareness program but an interactive session where the students take part in the session.

With the theme "Celebrate a world of flavors", the NSS volunteers tried to raise awareness regarding proper eating habits, healthy habits before and after eating, basic steps of cleanliness and balanced diet, keeping in mind that cooking and eating habits changes from rural to urban. However, reminding the students about clean habits, and healthy eating is quite apt.

The volunteers tried to use simple tactics for the students to understand about cleanliness habits: washing their hands before and after eating, taking a bath, combing their hair properly, brushing their teeth; good eating habits: washing vegetables before consuming, drinking clean water and having a balanced diet. The



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volunteers also focused on showing the students the steps of washing their hands and steps of brushing their teeth.

Small competitions were held on activities like drawing, identifying healthy food, and practically washing their hands. Gifts were distributed after the activities are done as an encouragement for the children to take part in interactive session.

Learning outcome: The outcome of campaign was positive and successful. The school students were able to learn and put into practice the simple tasks, for example, the steps of washing their hands before and after eating their meals. The students were also taught not to litter the candy wrapper after eating and were advised to drink a lot of water and have a good balance diet.

International Literacy Day is observed on the 8th of September each year. This year, the NSS Unit of St. Edmund's College celebrated International Literacy Day on the theme "Transforming Literacy Learning Spaces" on the 9th of September, 2022 at Kyrdemkhla Primary School. The main aim of the programme was to share and inspire the children of the school about the importance of learning how to read and write.

The NSS unit of St. Edmund's College, Shillong, conducted a Special Camp in one of the adopted villages of Mylliem Kyndong Nongkyntir from the 1st -7th October, 2022. There were 50 volunteers who had attended the camp and 3 Programme officers had accompanied the volunteers.

The NSS Unit of St Edmund's College, Shillong took the opportunity to conduct a Special Camp at Mylliem Kyndong Nongkyntir from the 10th to 17th April, 2023. The camp was a great opportunity for the volunteers to join the camp. There were a today of 53 volunteers who had participated in the camp along with the Programme Officers who had accompanied the volunteers.

During the camp, a number of home visits and mobilization activities were carried out, since there was a gap of about 4-5 months from the previous camp in the same village. Moreover, surveys were also conducted in the adopted village, where volunteers were able to complete 50 surveys on the first day, 60 surveys on the second day, and 26 surveys on the third day. For the surveys during the Special Camp, the volunteers divided themselves into groups of 5-6. They were each given 10 survey forms, and were asked to go different directions of the adopted village for the survey.

Another activity that was conducted at the camp was a friendly football match between the Seng Samla Shnong and St Edmund's College football team. This event was highly anticipated by the youths of the village and the volunteers, as it was one of the activities which really capture the interest and excitement of the youth, and where they also get to interact with each other with an attitude of sportsmanship. The match ended with St. Edmund's College emerging as the winner. Lunch was served to all the players of both the team and the NSS volunteers of the camp.











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Learning Outcome: The NSS volunteers got to learn about the status of education and employment amongst the local youths through surveys that they conducted in the adopted village. The volunteers had to experience ups and downs during the surveys, but all these had benefitted them in their skills of communication. They were patience towards the community people and also learns as the people shares their answer and opinion on the survey. The football match between the St. Edmund's college team and the youth football team also imbibed in them a spirit of active participation and sportsmanship during the engagement.

The NSS Unit of St. Edmund's College had conducted a PRA at Mylliem Kyndong Nongkyntir on the 13.5.23. This activity was conducted after long-delayed months, as it one of the important activities during the NSS special camps in the adopted village.

PRA in simple terms can be understood as an assessment and learning process that empowers the community people to create the information base for planning and action. It means an approach which requires a good communication between the staffs and the community people to find out information about the problems, needs and potential in the community.

The resource person on the programme was, Mr. R. Langstieh, alongwith 8 NSS volunteers and NSS Programme Officers. The community people who were present comprised of youths and women organization, with a total representation of 18 individuals.

The programme started with the resource person initiating an ice breaking session, where he introduced himself to the local participants and they were also asked to do the same. He then asked the people about the problem they faced in the community and what needs to be focused. The resource person provided the participants with chart papers and stationaries in front of them. He asked them to participate by writing down in the chart papers.



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The participants were asked questions about the local problems and the people willing agreed to have a discussion among themselves. After a short deliberation, they nominated one member to write for them. Some of the problems faced by the villagers and were noted down by the participants include the poor condition of the school, no proper drainage or no proper waste disposal.

Through this PRA the unit will be able to understand the community infrastructure and conditions properly. As an adopted village the unit now has the responsibility to know about the community and how the village functions.

Learning outcomes: The outcome of the programme was successful as a number of the community people had come to take part in the session. The students were able to learn about the skills and ways on how to engage with local community people and to try to encourage the people to open up and share their views and problems. Through the ice-breaking session the people were able to participate in listing down the problems that the community faced.
