3.1 Course Structure:

Module VII (Research Outputs) in the table above is highlighted to display the session covered by the Incubation Centre. This session was designed to teach students what to do with the outcomes of their research. Previous sessions had emphasised data-collection through surveys, interviews, questionnaires etc. Module VII instructed them how to fabricate robust work — in the form of journal articles and reports — thereby monetising their efforts. Therefore, this session also underscored employable skills.

3.2 Objectives of the Course:

The objectives of the course are listed below. Point 'd' (highlighted in bold below) was an objective set by the Incubation Centre for this course.

- a. Introduce the learners the basic of research methodology
- b. Acquaint them with the tools and techniques of research methods
- c. Examine the problems of research
- d. How to develop a *logic-flow* in writing

Along with structuring their work for reports or journals, the participants would also be instructed on another segment of research — plagiarism.

3.3 Learning Outcomes:

The outcomes of the course are listed below. Point 'e' (highlighted in bold below) was emphasised by the Incubation Centre for this course.

- a. Students will be able to comprehend the basics of research methodology.
- b. They will understand the various characteristics and types of research.
- c. Construct research designs and differentiate various types of research designs.
- d. Students will be able to carry out the investigation and foresee the difficulties one may encounter.
- e. Familiarise the students with elementary research etiquette and enlighten them on the accepted process of publishing their research

3.4 Programme of the Course:

This course was organized by the Department of Sociology over eight days. Each session included a 15-20-minute classroom discussion. The programme of the course is listed in the table below:


Final grades were based on the total score attained for each of the assignments given by the course instructors. The Department of Sociology handled this aspect of the VAC.

ASSESSMENT AND RESULTS

The MCQ, designed by the Research Facilitator, sought to test the participants' knowledge of the matter taught during the two-hour session.

6.1 Methodology of evaluation:

Each question carried one mark. So, in total, the ten questions were worth 10 marks. Marks from all assignments (based on the modules taught by the other instructors) were used to obtain a final percentage score.

Thus, if a student scored 38/40, the final percentage was calculated as 95% (38/40 x 100).

6.2 Composition of the assignment:

The MCQs were based *entirely* on the subject-matter discussed in the session. These questions were designed to test the aptitude of participants for primary internet-based research and prevent the use of unfair means. One of the questions was based on UGC regulations against plagiarism. Several questions were situation-based and replicated the formats of advanced competitive exams. Moreover, participants would have to do an internet-based search to validate their answers. A few examples of these questions are listed below. The answers are highlighted in yellow.

Question 4. Plagiarism can be avoided by:

Option 1: Copying the work of others accurately

Option 2: Paraphrasing the author's text in your own words

Option 3: Cut and pasting from the Internet

Option 4: Quoting directly without revealing the source

<u>Question 6.</u> Wanborlang has written a paper on kinship among the Monpas of Tawang and is preparing to submit his work to *Science*, *Technology and Society* (a journal). How should he proceed?

Option 1: Examine the aims and scope of the journal to check if his topic matches those listed by the journal

Option 2: Tailor his article according to the journal's Manuscript Submission Guidelines

Option 3: Both Options A and B

Option 4: None of the above

Question 8. Which of the following journals are legitimate?

Option 1: Big Data & Society

Option 2: Young

Option 3: Contributions to Indian Society

Option 4: All of the above




Figure 2: Total Score (out of 10)

Out of the 44 students who registered for the course, only 37 responded to the MCQs. The lowest score was 3, while the highest was 7. 14 participants attained 7 marks. **Figure 2** below scores attained by the students for the module on 'Research Outputs'.

6.4 Analysis:

An assessment of the scoring pattern from Figure 2 elicits relevant discussion points. They are outlined below:

- a. Question 1 saw 89% of the participants answer correctly. Similarly, question 4 had 95% of the participants respond correctly. High attainment scores for these questions, which discussed plagiarism and the regulation against it, indicate the success (and clarity) of this module's objective to educate the participants on the third segment of this course (refer to page 6 for details).
- b. Only 19% of the participants responded correctly to the question on peer review, which had an aspect of relativism. Still, since this specific issue was discussed in the session (using genuine images of fake invitations), the participants were also tested for their ability (especially concerning note-making) to recollect vital classroom discussions.
- c. 95% of the participants understood how to acknowledge contributions from individuals who have not actively worked on a paper.
- d. Question 3, based on in-text citations, saw 81% of the participants respond incorrectly. This lack of understanding should be juxtaposed with point 'c'. It could indicate that students understand the *what* of attributions but not the *how*.
- e. A 46% success rate for question 8, which required participants to perform a basic internet search, highlights the requirement for familiarization with online processes.

6.5 Recommendations:

Based on the observations and inferences from section 6.4, this report submits the following recommendations:

- a. **Online skills:** The drive to tackle plagiarism and to assess 'effort' has seen an erosion of necessary skills to perform online searches for information. A classroom with Wi-Fi connectivity where teachers can demonstrate how to look for data will be a step in the right direction.
- b. **Practical knowledge:** The participants expressed the need for "practicals" during the session. The Incubation Centre will, thus, incorporate library visits in future VACs.
- c. **Quantitative knowledge:** Participants require additional classes on data-collection and data-interpretation. For instance, the participants were unaware of official data sources for family welfare. Furthermore, participants felt that the segment on in-text citations

and plagiarism was "too technical". Students must, therefore, be exposed repeatedly to such sessions on 'methodology' to internalise this vital aspect of research.




Only 39 of the 44 students who registered for this course responded to the coordinator's request for feedback. The analysis is depicted below.

1. Please give your valuable feedback on the following:




2. Did the course familiarise you with the process of publishing?






Image 1: The Research Facilitator explaining plagiarism to the students.
