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

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

In the context of the present pandemic scenario, the College is using a Management Information System (MIS) supported by Linways Technologies Pvt. Ltd. in delivering effective teaching learning process. In the LMS portal, the following modules are active:

- 1. Staff Profile & Login
- 2. Student Profile & Login
- 3. Timetable, attendance, course index file, study material, assignment, online exam, virtual assignment, and assessments.

Each and every stakeholder is given appropriate training on the usage of the above LMS and the following online portal was extensively used along with the regular classroom teaching-learning process.

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The College, being an affiliated Institution, has limited scope in restructuring the UG courses of the University. However, the members of the staff are part of different Board of Studies (BOS), School Boards of the University and are involved in revision of the syllabus of different courses in line with the UGC guidelines. In addition, the various Departments have organized webinars on Professional Ethics, Life Skills and human values to further augment the curriculum of the different streams. The students are encouraged to participate in such extra initiatives and make the learning relevant to real life situations. The Departments introduced ADD ON/VALUE ADDED COURSES which ran simultaneously along with the regular course. For the Science departments, emphasis was given for hands-on training, 'practical's' beyond the syllabi, and projects under the guidance of the faculty. A well structured plan for such activities is in place for effective delivery of Learning Outcomes. The Feedback from the stakeholders is analyzed to further calibrate the Teaching-Learning modules to make learning interesting, real and fun.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The students' feedback on curriculum, teaching -learning process are collected, studied and acted upon by the departments to address the need. On assesement, students are categorized as ADVANCED ACHIEVERS and LOW ACHIEVERS. Special classes in the form of tutorials, remedial coaching, cooperative learning methods, sharing of course materials are arranged for Low Achievers. Advanced Achievers are offered specially designed programmes such as hands on training, interraction with eminient resource persons, and field trips to gain more exposure in the relevant field. All differently able students are provided with Braille tools and audio visual aids. The effective mentoring processes are aimed at nurturing a symbiotic relationship between the students and the teachers that provides a significant contribution for the overall growth of a student. The students are given proper attention by all the stakeholders in reference to his/her queries, difficulties etc.

The assesement of the graduating students are analysed through Bloom's taxamony using learning indicators as per UGC guidelines and depicted by graphical representation.

2.3 - Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

In pursuance of the vision and mission statement of the college, the college prepares a well planned academic timetable which takes into account regularclasses along with short term/value added courses. Emphasis is given for hands on training on topics beyond the syllabi specially for the science stream. Projects on topics relevant to experimental learning are designed which are guided by the experienced faculty and the students are encouraged to undertake such projects as a part of their curriculum.

Webinars/workshops are arranged for the students on topics such as Research oppourtinities, employment ability skills, tools & technique in experimental sciences, how to read scientific literature— Introduction to MANAV ATLAS, CVwriting, IT career options, entreprenuership skills etc.

The mentoring of the final year students plays a significant role in building confidence among the students and prepare them for the job oppourtinities and or pursuing further studies.

All the classrooms are equipped with LCD projector, Wi-Fi connectivity, laptops/desktops which are extensively used by the faculty for effective delivery of learning outcomes. Course materials are shared among the students by using a dedicated Learning Management System (LMS) namely the Linways portal which the students can access online. The Internal assessments in the

The details of Internal assesementare communicated to the students at thebeginning of the session through the academic calendar posted in the website. The students are encouraged to approach the members of the faculty with regards to their doubts, confusion etc., pertaining to the course material, pattern/mode of examination and evaluation. Internal test and assignments are conducted with immediate feedback of the results to the students. The students are given the evaluated answer scriptand their grievances, if any, are addressed. The college maintains and monitors the attendance record of each student centrally as well as

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in their respective departments. The progress made or lack of attendance is communicated to the students and their parents through Parent-Teacher Meetings and during the mentoring process. In keeping with thenature in which young learners acquire knowledge and skills, the Departments assess the student's attainment levels through various means like: Open-Book examinations, Online Multiple-Choice-Questions, Presentations made using different tools and techniques, etc. Most importantly, the college offers the studentsample opportunities to improve their performance by giving more than one test and picking the best result as Internal Marks.

The Institution ensures that all the physical facilities which include: classrooms, laboratories, library etc., are maintained by qualified anddedicated associate staffs. A dedicated policy is in place, whereby budgetallocation for each department onexpendables, maintenance is fixed. Different committees namely: the Building and Maintenance Committee, CanteenCommittee, Purchase Committee are in place that ensure the proper utilization of funds. The Purchase Committee follows the GF rules for the choice ofvendors/contractors for the allotment of work which is done on the basis of COMPETITIVE PRICE INDEX (CPI) and Quality Assurance (QA). The same is employedduring the procurement of equipment/instruments. Procurement and maintenanceof Books/Journals of the Library (Central/Departmental) are done through the Library Committee, which is approved by the Management. Waste management and cleanliness is carried out by committed cleaners in association with the LocalMunicipal Board for Garbage disposal.Laboratories' safety protocols, SOPsare documented and forwarded to the respective laboratories for compliance. Safety audit of the campus is ensured with the installation of fire fightingequipment, ample storage of water in the form of underground reservoir, following the directive issued by the Local administrations. Dedicated solarpanels are installed on the campus. For adequate lighting in all theclassrooms, SFL/LED lights are fitted to reduce power consumption withoutcompromising on the brightness required. Two, 25 KVA generators are in placefor uninterrupted power supply during College hours. The sports facilities, indoor and outdoor, are well maintained by dedicated staff along with properlighting facility that can be used at night as well. The entire physicalinfrastructure, including the college greenery, is adequately maintained bydedicated personnel with the active supervision by a team of faculty members.

As a policy the College, does not have a Student Council. In its place, thereis an elaborate mechanism of providing opportunities and facilities to thestudents for different activities. The students are given ample opportunities to have their views placed at various Committees formed with a senior teacher asConvener. Each class nominates two Class Representatives (Male/Female) and two Assistant Class Representatives (Male/Female), which provides adequate connect between the Students and the Staff. Animators fordifferent activities (Cultural, Sports, etc.) are selected by the Management totake full responsibility for the activities of the 'College Month'. Students are askedto participate, deliberate and express their views on matters related to he Library, Canteen, Games, Sports affairs, etc. In the IQAC Committee, two seniorstudents are selected to be part of the group that looks into the overallsmooth functioning of the College. The College encourages the Departments topublish their Departmental Magazines wherein students are called upon toincorporate their ideas to design and collect articles from their classmates forthe publication of the same. The College Magazine -Edmundianis being fully taken care ofby a group of final year students that act as Student-Editors. During thecelebration of National Science Day in the form of a SCIENCE MELA, student-volunteers take full responsibility to organize a successful programme wherein science models, posters, etc., are displayed and school students are invited tovisit and interact with the participants. A group of dedicated NSS/NCCvolunteers undertake full responsibility for any Outreach Programme such as Community Service, visit to villages as Extension activities, etc.

As has been mentioned earlier, St. Edmund's College does not have

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a full fledged Students Union or Council. However, a Student Body is constituted annually to organize various programmes in the College. The process starts with the selection of Class Representatives (CR) and Assistant Class Representatives (ACR) from each Honours Department. Being a co-educational College, equal number of boys and girls get a chance of representing their respective Departments. Thus four students from each of the twenty one departments are elected through secret ballots on an appointed day in the presence of a teacher, the role of the teacher being strictly supervisory. Subsequently, just before the commencement of the College Fest, namely, 'EDBLAZON', a larger student body comprising senior-most students is constituted that looks after the student related activities, both inside and outside the College. The students, thus selected, on the strength of certain defined parameters, by the Principal and a group of teachers, are responsible for the success of any activity that they are assigned to carry out. The selected members of the student body thus formed are called ANIMATORS quided by One GENERAL ANIMATOR, Four JOINT GENERAL ANIMATORS, Two SECURITY COORDINATORS and a host of volunteers. They are entrusted with the responsibility of leading the College throughout the academic year for which they are selected. These students are also part of the various committees that look after the Calendar of Events fixed by the College. Apart from these, the student volunteers from NCC, NSS, RRC, Eco Club, Science Club, Lee Artisan Club, Music society, Culinary Club, SEC-IIC are in constant touch to make sure that things are carried out in a planned manner.

6.1.2 - The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management.

Decentralization and participative management:

The admission process is completely transparent and decentralized at the Departmental level. To begin with a very open and frank discussion is held by the Management with all the Head of Departments. This helps to draw on the lessons learnt from previous experiences regarding the admission process. Changes if required are made to the admission policies, through wide consensus. These policies are documented and then circulated to the rest of the Staff through the respective Head of Departments. Each Head then constitutes its own core team. This team looks after the entire admission process from the distribution of admission forms, collection, and the instructions to the admitted candidates. The faculty also takes it upon themselves to counsel probable students on the best subject combinations. The shortlisted candidates for admission are personally informed while the ones in the 'wait-list' are also informed of their chances. This transparent admission process through individual departments based on criteria set by them is graciously accepted. The Management participates in the total process only as a supervisory entity, very rarely having to intervene.

Celebration of College Festivities:

The Annual College Fest (EDBLAZON) is completely decentralised and mainly managed by the students through the Class Representatives and Assistant Class Representatives, who vote the Animators for the various events. The organisation, planning and execution of all the events are done by the students in consultation with the Teacher-in-Charge. The students oversee every detail including the scouting for judges for the various events, seeing to the security and safety of all concerned, etc. The level of interest generated by the students, for their peers to participate is amazing, thus giving the Fest a very distinctive flavour. The competition is healthy and the emphasis is on participation, especially for the

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senior most students. The role of the Management is nominal except in matters of finances. In the evaluation of the Fest, the greatest achievement is to see individual students grow in responsibility and confidence.

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7.2.1 - Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Best Practice 1

1. Title of the practice:

Life Skills - Coping with Stress during Pandemic Times.

1. The context that required the initiation of the practice:

India was suddenly thrown into a nationwide lockdown in mid-March 2020, and the young students of St. Edmund's College were taken by surprise. Many of them, staying in hostels or as paying guests, couldn't return home, especially if they were from other States of India. Nobody was sure how long the lockdown would last and with each passing day, the stress and anxiety increased. There was uncertainty that surrounded not only 'academic learning', but the real threat to life by the virus. The media, especially the social media, did not help to allay the fears. Hence the students needed training of Life-Skills, to Cope with Stress.

1. Objectives of the practice:

The Assignments offered in the program, were to help the students to become aware of their emotions, especially related to stress. Then to deal with those emotions effectively. Lastly, to share the skills they've learnt with family and friends. Assignments offered the opportunity to connect with the College, expressing themselves through interests like: art, gardening, poetry writing, camera shoots, etc.

1. The Practice:

Every fortnight, the students were sent various materials for reflection by way of videos, audio clips, articles, etc. If the files were too big, they were sent as a link in the Google Drive. There were generally five questions for them to respond to so that they could deepen the content, and get in touch with their inner strengths. The material was dispatched through the College

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dedicated LMS platform, which generated an alert each time, and also gave them the time-line to respond. This also made it easy for the students to upload their responses in the system, making the marking the assignments that much easier. For every assignment the student submitted, s/he earned a score of 10 points, the maximum being 50 points. Within the system there was provision to offer a personal note of encouragement to the student, based on her/his responses. The feedback on the assignment created its own interest in the students. While the Assignments were loaded in the student's individual 'cell', they also got an SMS, which invited them to respond to the material that was posted. The materials sent to them were not only current, but also of interest to young minds, catering to their varied interests. For instance, if they were into gardening, they could upload pictures of how well their garden was doing. The time limit to respond to the assignments was both a help and a hindrance, as some responded immediately on receiving the material, while others procrastinated and missed the closing date.

 Obstacles faced, if any, and strategies adopted to overcome them:

Participation in this exercise was voluntary, without marks, grades or credits to be gained for it so it had to be driven by intrinsic motivation. To get around this obstacle, attractive material was shared. The majority of the students were interacting with the resource person for the first time hence help from the Head of Departments was sought. The students had issues with the network and so the deadlines were rescheduled to give additional time. The students were not always familiar with the College Learning Management System, so this something that got corrected with time.

1. Impact of the practice:

The greatest sign of the impact was the number of students that responded to and submitted their assignments. These students were also from Departments across the board, indicating that the assignments were beneficial to all three major Streams of study in the College: the Arts, the Science and the Commerce. Some of the students had honestly shared their strengths and weaknesses while responding to certain questions. That surely was a sign that they

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could trust the College to guide them. Also the fact that the students ranged from all the semesters was another sign of the program being well received. The whole practice was aimed at keeping the students engaged intellectually and creatively and the impact was palpably felt through the active participation of students.

1. Resources required:

The resources required were: video and audio clips as well as materials to read and reflect on. The network was a critical resource for delivery of the content and feedback. Having the LMS platform in College, was a great boost to ensure smooth delivery and feedback.

With the introduction of National Education Policy (NEP2020) in Higher Educational Institutions, the college need to invest in new fields/domains such as Research- Swachhta- Innovation in addition to normal teaching learning processes. It is deemed appropriate to establish an Innovation Council as mandated by Ministry of Education Innovation Council (MIC), Government of India. In the middle of the lockdown due to Pandemic, few members of the staff and students get together and formed the Innovation Council as per laid down principles of MIC and got the approval with ID202015433. The college wish to contribute to and take responsibility onthe concept of "Aatma Nirbhar Bharat" in the present reality which the world is facing that is transforming the way we live!

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- 1. Objectives of the practice:
 - Innovate today for a better tomorrow"

To facilitate a viable ecosystem in the campus for critical thinking, problem solving, innovations and start-ups. The students are encouraged and motivated to think and dream beyond syllabi; identify and develop a proposal on a topic relevant to local and or national level; build a model that can be verified and standardised for a working model on start-ups.

1. The Practice:

The Council initiated its activities using the expertise of Alumni Network, local Entrepreneurs and organised online impact lecture series bringing in eminent Entrepreneurs from all over India. The students and faculties were exposed to the idea/concepts of Entrepreneurship, innovations, start-ups - the challenges and prospects of such ventures. The social media accounts (face book, Instagram and twitter) were activated and presently there are 220 members participating in sharing of ideas and thoughts. Regular formal and informal interactions and meetings are held to discuss and deliberate on the working schedule of the council. The students were asked to identify issues, think critically and propose a working model through online presentation as well as in physical mode. All the self-driven and MIC driven activities were recorded and uploaded in the MIC portal for evaluation and assessment. The council members are in constant touch with the eminent persons and MIC experts to explore ideas and concept notes. The students are motivated to participate in all activities of the council and it is expected to yield an outcome in line with the mission of MIC.

 Obstacles faced, if any, and strategies adopted to overcome them:

The college being a non-technical science- arts-commerce affiliated college, it has very limited scope to design and start new courses relevant to the present theme. However, the college plans to develop a friendly ecosystem for all so that the students get ample opportunity to explore- tinker and develop a project based on real issues. Resource management is an issue which is being look at by exploring avenues like alumni network, government funding and self-finance. A research facility, tinkering laboratory are in place to be used by the students under the

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supervision of a technical expert. The management shall support any viable project developed by the students after proper assessment, evaluation and approval from the experts. The Council shall take the expert advice from the Kaziranga University, Assam, the mentor institution assigned by MIC under Mentor- Mentee Flagship Programme to further augment its activities.

1. Impact of the practice:

The students are enthused to take part in self- driven and MIC driven activities, share their thoughts and ideas, identify an issue and its solution. The participation in online/offline model presentations has been encouraging. Hands on training on Candle Making, Herbal Soap, Vermi compose (Organic manure) are carried out and the feasibility of such projects as "Pilot Start-ups" involving local vendors and entrepreneurs being work upon. All the activities of the council were shared with the MIC peer team members for evaluation. The activities of the college were recognised and the college is allowed to participate in IIC 4.0 programmes. Recently, the college received ONE STAR for its activities, the only non-technical college in Meghalaya to be recognised by MIC, Government of India. It is expected that a sincere effort from all stakeholders shall give a positive result and the college can contribute to the nation building process of Self Sufficiency.

The college council has established a strong relationship with Ministry of Education Innovation Council (MIC) and the mentor institution assigned to foster a platform in innovations, start-ups problem solving, design thinking, IPR, marketing etc. The vibrant Alumni network is helping to plan and organize impact lectures on the theme mandated by the MIC, Govt. of India. Dedicated space as tinkering lab, innovation hub cum Central Instrumentation lab (CIC) is in place funded by the management

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ST.EDMUND'S COLLEGE POLICY FOR STUDENT ADMISSION

- The Core Committee for the Admissions shall consist of Br. R. Noronha (Secretary); Dr S. Lamare (Principal); Mr. M. Chakravarty (Vice Principal); Br. S. Julius (Finance Officer); and Br. S. Coelho (IQAC Coordinator).
- 2) Every HOD will share with the Principal the conditions for admission in their respective departments such as the cut-off mark, subject combination, the special requirements likecompetency in English, Mathematics, etc.
- 3) All data for the Admissions will be Online through LMS portal with provision for the students to pay the Application Fee of Rs 100/- with the help of a voucher generated online. The application number is allotted accordingly.
- 4) The Applicants' data and the application number will be shared with all the HODs, within 24 hours of the Board results being declared and or submission of application form by the prospective candidate willing to take admission. The department shall select/shortlist the candidates for their respective departments in consultation with the Secretary/Principal. The email to be sent by the respective department to the shortlisted candidates and the list to be displayed in the college website.
- 5) Students who have passed class XII science examination shall need to be interviewed by the HOD for suitability to take up Commerce at undergraduate level.
- 6) A notice for admission procedure will be displayed at a suitable place in the campus and also in the college website.

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- 7) The Reservation Policy of 60:40 with respect to state tribal and others shall be followed for the first two lists, after which the admission will be on merit.
- 8) If a student asks for concession/subsidy/instalment option on full payment of fees, they are to pay at least 50% of the prescribed fee or initially a sum of Rs 10,000/- whichever is lower. The rest of the money can be paid within a month of the classes commencing. A correspondence may be sent to the Secretary/Principal in this regard before payment
- 9) The application procedure for Position Holders or with an aggregate of 80% to be fast-tracked for completion of admission procedures.
- 10) The policy for admission to be reviewed before starting of new academic session.

- "Overview: The project will be carried out over a duration of three months, involving minimum 100 hours for General students and minimum 180 hours for Honours students. Every student should do a project individually and not in a group. The selected project can be either of type Model 1 or Model 2 described below.
- » Platform: The project can be in any platform e.g., DOS, WINDOWS, UNIX, LINUX, Mac OS, etc.
- » Language and package: The project can be done using any language or package learned within or outside the course such as C, C++, Java, VB, C#, Director, tel, VC++, Visual FoxPro, Flash, etc.
- » Venue: The project can be done in the College itself or in a reputed organization.
- " Guides: Internal Guides from within the college should be assigned to each student. If the project is to be done in a reputed organization, an External Guide from that organization is also required as Co-Guide, and the qualification of the External Guide should not be less than that of the Internal Guide.
- Monitoring of Projects: The progress of the project should be monitored through seminars, and each of the seminars should be evaluated, a record of which should be maintained. Every student will have to maintain a log book where the coding of the project is kept. This will have to be periodically signed by the internal guide. The number of seminars should not be less than three (e.g. Analysis, Design Implementation).
- Final Examination: For the final external evaluation a brief summary of the project should be submitted to the university at least one week prior to the date of the examination for the benefit of the external examiner(s).

Model 2

- This model can be of a typical business application. The aim of this type is to highlight the stages involved in a typical business oriented project development, though on a miniature scale, in a real or simulated environment. The appropriate use of DBMS/RDBMS towards any business application, along with adequate system analysis and structured design and development of specific tools/products, would be the underlying activity in preparing this project. The emphasis should be on selecting a system/subsystem that shows the DBMS/ RDBMS and System Analysis aspects to a greater degree. Any small and simple business system may be selected, although candidates are advised to use their knowledge and creativity, to select typical and intelligent applications, rather than run-of-the-mill themes, such as simple Pay roll calculation or Issue-Retum portion of an inventory scheme. The Evaluation stage would give due weightage for theme selection, problem analysis, fact finding techniques and initial design, which is as close to reall-life business situations as possible.

 The code can be generated out of 4 GL Interface, like Screen Builder and Report Generator, Application Generator/Program Code Generators, or can be totally hand-coded or a combination of both. The documentation need not contain the code generated by these applications, but only that written by the candidate.

At the end of the 2nd year coursework, the students are to be advised to prepare a project proposal in consultation with the faculty member(s) for approval by the department of the college/institution where they are pursuing the programme. The concerned department has to allot a faculty member under whose supervision the student has to prepare the project report. The report may be of a research/software design/consultancy type or any other academically/professionally justified one. The report shall contain the objectives and scope of the study, methodology used, importance of the study, recommendations etc along with flowchart, ER-diagrams, DFDs, source code, relevant charts, diagrams and bibliography te where applicable.

A certificate of the Supervisor / the Head of the department/ program, certifying the authenticity of the report shall be attached the drewith. The student will submit a copy of the report to the Head of the concerned department/ programme. The report should be neatly typed in A-4 size paper and soft bound (paperback) with a front page specifying the particulars of the student and the title of the project.

B. COMPREHENSIVE VIVA

The comprehensive viva voce is to be scheduled at the end of the third year (at the time of project evaluation) in order to judge the complete personality of the student along with the understanding as well as application of the knowledge gained by the student at the end of the programme. The idea is to see whether the student has been able to comprehend what has been taught during the three-year programme and see their relevance not only in the practical field but also their interrelationship. The student is expected to answer questions raised about concepts taught in the programme.

Evaluation

The evaluation of the project report and the comprehensive viva voce will be done by three examiners—two externals to be appointed by the university and the other internal by the college/institution. The average of the two closest marks awarded by the three examiners will be taken into account for the result.

Response Q1: What was the nature/mode of classes you attended?



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



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
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Response Q2: What was the approximate coverage of your syllabus?



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
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Response Q3: What was your level of understanding during the class?



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
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Response Q4: How you have received the study material through?



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
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Response Q5: Did you ask questions and clear your doubts during class?



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
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Response Q6: Did you do additional reading/discuss with your friends about your syllabus?



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
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Response Q7: Have you participated in online assignment/MCQ question/exams/seminars etc. for assessment



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
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Response Q8: What Percentage of online classes would you prefer?



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
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Response Q9: What according to you are the positive aspects related to your online class during this semester?



Therefore the College has chalked out methods related to both the Internal and Final Examinations:

- At the beginning of the academic year, students are informed about the examination pattern that they must adhere to in an academic year – Internal Tests and Final Examination.
- 2. The Final Examination schedule is provided to the students as and when the same arrives from the University. Information of the Examination is displayed in the Notice Board and the College Website. In case of any error in the Examination schedule, with regards to the combination of subjects, etc, the College authority makes it a point to write about such errors to the affiliated University at the earliest.
- 3. The students are also apprised about the Internal Tests ranging from assignments, paper presentations, student seminars, quizzes, etc. The schedule of these form of tests are at the discretion of every individual teacher, who informs the students well before hand.
- 4. To ensure the smooth functioning and conduct of the Final Examination, two to four invigilators are assigned to each hall depending on the size of the room.
- Internal tests and assignments are usually verified by the Head of the Department to ensure that the standard evaluation process is being adhered to by the teachers' of the department.
- Corrected tests and assignment scripts are distributed to the students for their perusal. Any discrepancy or grievance, if there may be, is brought to the notice of the teacher concerned. Such grievances are addressed immediately.
- 7. Any information regarding filling of registration forms and paying of examination fees as well as the last date of submission are put up on the College Notice board and College Website.

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

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




Fig 4: Graphical representation of attainment level scored by the students with the PO-CO mapping




Fig 4: Graphical representation of attainment level scored by the students with the PO-CO mapping

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





Fig 2: Graphical representation of average attainment level of the Course Outcomes (COs) with at least one PO




Fig 3: Graphical representation of average PO & CO mapping




Fig 4: Graphical representation of attainment level scored by the students with the PO-CO mapping




Fig 4: Graphical representation of attainment level scored by the students with the PO-CO mapping




Fig 2: Graphical representation of average attainment level of the Course Outcomes (COs) with at least one PO

 $Fig\ 3:$ Graphical representation of average PO & CO mapping




Fig 4: Graphical representation of attainment level scored by the students with the PO-CO mapping




Fig 1: Graphical representation of the Course Outcomes (COs)






Fig 2: Graphical representation of average attainment level of the Course Outcomes (COs) with at least one PO





Fig 3: Graphical representation of average PO & CO mapping




Fig 1: Graphical representation of the Course Outcomes (COs)




Fig 2: Graphical representation of average attainment level of the Course Outcomes (COs) with at least one PO





Fig 3: Graphical representation of average PO & CO mapping




Fig 2: Graphical representation of average attainment level of the Course Outcomes (COs) with at least one PO




Fig 1: Graphical representation of the Course Outcomes (COs)




Fig 2: Graphical representation of average attainment level of the Course Outcomes (COs) with at least one PO




Fig 4: Graphical representation of attainment level scored by the students with the PO-CO mapping






Fig 2: Graphical representation of average attainment level of the Course Outcomes (COs) with at least


13. Programme on World Aids Day, Organized by MACS

The programme organized by Meghalaya AIDS Control Society (MACS) in collaboration with the Meghalaya State Legal Services Authority was held at U Soso Tham Auditorium, Shillong.

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The Chief guest, Shri. Sampath Kumar Commissioner and Secretary, Health & Family Welfare Department, Govt of Meghalaya and President, Meghalaya AIDS Control Society Shillong, informed that Meghalaya ranks 5th in the country in terms of prevalence of HIV cases and 2nd in the highest number of syphilis cases among pregnant women. Therefore, concerted efforts are required in creating awareness on preventive measures to address these health issues. Furthermore, he cited that the COVID-19 pandemic has brought into focus the importance of health care and the need to strengthen the health system. Praising the role of NACO and MACS for their continued fight to educate the masses on HIV and end stigmatization, he stressed on the importance of testing and adherence to treatment.

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14. Program for "Audience Analysis Workshop"

Date: 28.11.20

Duration: 2 Hours (5:00 pm - 7:00 pm)

Objectives: To end violence against children

On the 28th of November 2020, the NSS Volunteers attended a workshop for the Audience Analysis, with the Volunteers of Aspirational Districts. Where its aim was to "End Violence Against Children".

The first resource person started off with a small game called 'Never have I ever', where certain questions were being asked i.e., If anyone has stood against violence, came across child rights abuse and so on; in which the volunteers shared some of their experiences based on the questions that were being asked to them.

Secondly, the Volunteers were being directed to the purpose of the workshop, which was to "End the Violence Against Children" specially in the North East region. The purpose project aims to begin outreach with young people associated with NSS in 40 districts in the North East (33 in Assam and the 7 aspiration districts in the other states), by involving them in planning, design of initiatives and communication assets and involve young influencers on social media with massive reach.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

As it is known from the extensive research, the most poignant from the voice and experience of children themselves, violence against children knows no borders. It cuts across boundaries of gender, age, race, culture, wealth and geography. It happens at home, on the streets, in schools, online, in the workplace, in the justice system and in institutions meant to care for children. No country is unaffected. Preventing and eliminating violence against children is a truly universal agenda.

The session was a successful one, and was of great importance for the Volunteers, as it helps in seeing how important it is in order to look into the matter of violence against children. And how each and everyone has a part to take in order to correct the wrong and to discuss on how to prevent this and make the people aware of the Do's and Don'ts.

The workshop was an informative as well as fun experience for the NSS volunteers and brought to light the current problems of children especially in the Northeast. The workshop mainly focused on child marriage and violence against children which includes bullying. The

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hosts made sure to make the workshop an interactive session by including discussions from the volunteers" experience and games at intervals. The workshop aims to end violence against children and to end child marriage which still prevails with the highest rates being in the northeast, Tripura and Arunachal Pradesh holding the highest numbers.

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15. Workshop on "Issues related to ending violence against Children"

Objectives: Increasing capacities of young people from North East of India

on Children's Rights

On the 8th of January 2021, UNICEF organized an online workshop focusing on the issues related to ending violence against children. The workshop started at 5pm with the host - Sir Sonal Roshan - stating the aim of the workshop. The host then went on to question the volunteers and involve them in a discussion concerning the topics of bullying and violence. 
The workshop was a beneficial platform for the volunteers to understand the forms of violence, child rights violations, the circle of violence or pattern of violence and the online violence which threatens children today.

He emphasised more on "Interpersonal Communication" and "Behavioural Change Approach" as effective tools to combat and the use of plastic and other waste which can be a menace. A practical session was also enacted in the session where Mr Lyngdoh distributed different kinds of plastic and its patent numbers to raise awareness of what kind of plastics can be recycled and which cannot be recycled. Another practical session involved a video presentation of his routine and ways he adopted to cut the use of single use plastic and also showcased his wife's pocket bag which is convenient and eco friendly in nature. Before ending his session he also took a Questions round and a large number of volunteers participated with the questions.

After the Lunch break another session took place with Bah Mark Kharkongor, Consultant Swacch Bharat Mission Gramin. His Session began with a question of "What is considered as a waste?". He Continued with his viewpoint that "There is no such thing as a Waste" as a lay man we consider anything that has no value as a waste but in his understanding, he pointed

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out that everything has a value we only need to look for it. With this he proceeded with a video presentation where he stood to his and showcased the work he's been doing and the video shows that many plastics and other material we threw can be reused for other purposes. He also claimed that the single use plastic is the hardest type of plastic which got almost no value but on the contrary he said that it can be used for construction of roads in the state and in fact this work has officially begun since 2019.

Before concluding the session, he brought more insights into the methods of composting and the usefulness of Sawpit. The programme ended with another question and answer round. The Program Ended at 4:20pm.




19. Felicitation Programme of NSS Animators, SEC Unit

The webinar started at 12am and the Host for the program was Pratiksha Kaushik, she welcomed everyone to the webinar and talked about Biodiversity and that we should protect and conserve our mother earth, she also mentioned the theme for Biodiversity Day 2021 which was "We Are Part of the Solution #Nature". In order to start with the program a prayer was led by one of the students from the EVS department, the prayer was followed by a welcome speech by Ichha Limbu from EVS department 6th semester. A speech was given by the Principal, Dr. Sylvanus Lamare, he congratulated all the students for preparing and organizing the webinar celebrating Biodiversity Day. After the speech a short clip was presented by the students showing the biodiversity of nature, the clip included photos and videos on nature. An announcement was made the ACR of the 6th semester for the winners of Photography and arts competition organized by the students from the EVS Department.

The resource person of the webinar was Dr. Shivam Shrotriya who is a renowned scientist and he also has a PhD in Wildlife Science. He started with a presentation that he prepared "The Faunal Diversity in extreme Ecosystems", firstly he asked a question "What do you understand by biodiversity?" and the students answered to the question then he showed two pictures, one was a waterfall and the other was in a city with traffic, here he asked which one is biodiversity and one of the student said both and it was the correct answer. He then talked about how all the species in earth are different from each other and through the interactions among us it creates the ecosystem, a picture was shown about ecology, each and every species has their own roles, most of the species are gone because of connections and every species are dependent on their habitats or ecosystems. The next point was about Cave Ecosystem, he showed a cave which is situated in Central India, it is a 600m long chamber

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
inside. The question was how can biodiversity emerge in caves? One of the student said water but water is not enough and since there are no plants means no photosynthesis. There are actually 10-11 species in the cave and he explained how a bat in a cave eats on insects and they bring the digested food and excrete and that becomes decayed. There are also fishes that survive inside the cave but these fishes and other species have gotten used to the dark nature since in caves it is always dark so most of the species are blinded meaning they lost their eyesight and also color. The next point was the 2nd extinct ecosystem which was Ladakh, the temperature there is very low and is also called the cold desert, the question was raised again that is there a variety of biodiversity in this place but surprisingly there are about 1100 plant species, 319 birds, 36 mammals, 15 Herpetofauna, 370 butterflies and about 3lakh people. He showed pictures of many species found in the area, there was a wolf too which is the oldest wolf in the world and it is called the Tibetan or Himalayan wolf. He talked about the major challenges to biodiversity and then ended with the presentation. An interactive session took place where students were asking question to the resource person. One of the teachers thanked the resource person for the incredible presentation. An announcement was again made by the ACR for the winners of the poetry and essay competition. A speech was given by the HOD of EVS department Dr. Jasmine Therese Sawian, she expressed gratitude to the resource person and all the students, the theme inspired to protect the nature and that it is the responsibility of us all to save it. A short quiz took place on biodiversity, after the quiz a vote of thanks was given by one of the students thanking everyone who registered and attended the webinar. The webinar ended at 1:24 p.m.


Assessment:



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22. World No Tobacco Day

Date: 31st May 2021

Time: 4:30 pm – 6:00 pm Platform: Google Meet Theme: "Commit to Quit"

The host of the webinar is Kanriiaki, the welcome speech was given by the Principal. All the participants took part in taking the pledge. A video was played by Aphisha Kharkongor which was entitled "What is the single best thing you can do to quit smoking".

While watching the video the Principal said in the group chat, "If a smoker spends Rs. 150/- a day, he will spent Rs. 54,750/- a year and Rs2,73,750/- in 5 years, if he quits smoking he could use the money to get something useful for himself and his family."

For the webinar we had a resource person whose name was Dr. Siddarth Banerjee who completed his bachelor of Dental Surgery from Guru Nanak Institution of Dental Science and Research Kolkata. He was introduced by Primoy Pakyntein.

The resource person first gave his greetings to the participants of the webinar, then he stated that although a lot of us may wish to ban tobacco we must also think about those who produces tobacco and earn their daily bread from this product. Then he went on to ask the as to why it is important to quit tobacco to which he himself answered that we all inherently know that it is bad for our health as well as for the people around us but still a lot of us find it hard to quit.

He first gave a general introduction of tobacco which is a plant which is grown as a cash crop which is then changed into various forms and is used as a material for various use. One such example is Biri which is manufactured in large quantities especially in India and most of the workers in such factories are women and children. People of low income usually consume these as they are cheap. One of the categories of tobacco are flavoured cigarettes, another category is low smoke tobacco (eg:hukka). Another type is smokeless tobacco which is consumed directly without burning the tobacco which people usually put in one side their mouth after which they feel a sense of euphoria. There is also a new form of tobacco which is banned in our country which is called Nicotine Delivery System which uses an electronic method. When we look into the facts and figures we can see two types of facts and figures one is nationwide and another is state level. Tobacco in India attributes to 19% total death due to heart disease whereas in Meghalaya it is 27.06%. Smoking affects almost all the parts of our body, smoking causes various types of cancers It also causes a lot of NCDs(Non Communicable Diseases) like stroke,

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pneumonia etc. Most of the smokers have cavity in their teeth. Smoking also reduces reproductive capacity in both men and women.

How tobacco leads to addiction?

Tobacco consists of a chemical called nicotine. When one smokes nicotine goes into the blood and directly goes to the brain and it attaches itself to the Nicotinic receptors after which a specific pathway gets activated which is known as the reward pathway after which we feel good because a specific chemical is released called dopamine which results in feelings of euphoria.

Why is it difficult to quit?

After experiencing it for the first time and we feel good then we want to use it more, then when we stop using tobacco the body is starved of nicotine which lowers the level of dopamine which causes the person to feel sad which causes various withdrawal symptoms.

How to overcome the addiction?

We have to develop a plan which must start with a quit date, inform the people around us so that they can support us, anticipating the challenges that is to come, remove all tobacco products from our environment

Challenges to quitting:

Physical addiction, emotional and psychological connection, behavior and social connection.

We can cope with withdrawal symptoms by drinking lots of water and engaging in healthy hobbies, increase appetite and weight gain, focus on positive thoughts, engage in physical activities. One of the most difficult challenges is tackling social and behavior connections which we can do by keeping ourselves positive and being prepared for any kind of relapse. Smoking is a social activity so we should not seize ties with our friends

The benefits of quitting are the blood pressure goes back to normal, the risk of getting a heart attack decreases, nicotine and carbon monoxide levels in our blood reduces, breathing becomes a lot easier, chances of getting lung cancer reduces by 30-50%,life starts moving in a different course.

The following were asked at the end of the interaction:

Can India take a step like New Zealand to completely ban smoking?

If eating tobacco is bad, then why can't it just ban it for good?

What is second hand smoking?


What happens when smoking with empty stomach?

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At what age is children most vulnerable to both passive and active smoking?

Tobacco causes pleasure but just as much as it gives it also takes up a lot from our lives. Not only is our health at risk but even the people around us is affected passively. This programme makes us aware of the dangers of tobacco consumption and the healthy ways in which we can overcome the addiction and ways to cope with the withdrawal symptoms. It helps us to come up with a systematic plan to quit.

Due to restrictions imposed by the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic the aforementioned program had to be conducted online. I have designed a PhD synopsis for my brother titled," Genetic screening of *Anabaena* present in Dal-Lake in Kashmir valley", which he is doing under the supervision of Prof. Bashir A. Ganai, Ex-Director, Centre of Research for Development, University of Kashmir-Srinagar. I have discussed this synopsis with him and I assured him that we will turn up with a good publication. Details

- 1.Science departments have established a link with Institutions, Industries for internship/summer training/winter school of the students during UG programme. Study tour field trips are organised to help the students aware with the latest teaching learning methodologies adopted in premier institutions.
- 2. The placement cell of the college arranges motivational lectures session; career guidance talks for the students to make them employable in a preferred job market. Students are also advised accordingly by the respective departments during choice of institutions while progressing for PG courses on completion of their graduation.
- 3. The institution has established linkages with NGO like MANBHA Foundation, KRIPA Foundation etc to extend its facilities for the weaker sections of the society. The Social Work department along with NSS volunteers visited various Old Age homes/Orphanages as a part of Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR). The NCC volunteers take active participation in different social awareness programmes arranged by the home department, social welfare department etc.
- 4. The College has established linkages with Biotech Park, Lucknow/Institute of Bioresources Sustainable Development (ISBD), Imphal/DBT, govt of India to organize Skill Development Programmes for the students to developed Entrepreneurial skills and Self-employment opportunities
- 5. The department of Biotechnology has established collaboration with Epygen Biotech Ltd, Dubai Mumbai, for imparting hands-on training on specialized field for the student.
- 6. Various institutions like ACTREC, Nagaland University, Biotech Park, Guwahati, Pasteur Institute, TOCKLAI, IASST, Tripura University, NEHU, ICAR Research Complex for NEH region, Sikkim State council of Science Technology etc. have agreed to train and impart skills to the students at the college for better employability.

2

Research and Development

As a Policy the management of the college encourages research and research related activities involving students to imbibe in them the idea of analysis and creative thinking. To that end seminars/workshops on Research Methodologies Tools are attempted with funding from DBT, DST, ICMR etc. The following details in this direction are in place

1. The college has received financial assistance from Department of Biotechnology, under Ministry of Science Technology, Govt of India for upgrading its resources in teaching learning process and to inculcate research activity involving the teachers and the students. Ten science departments have augmented its capability for effective Handson Training, managing practical's and projects beyond syllabi.

- 2. The Central Instrumentation Facility (CIF) created under the DST-FIST programme, helped the science faculties and their respective students in performing practical's, projects, dry wet labs with respect to any research problems/ programme initiated beyond the prescribed syllabi.
- 3. The Bioinformatics facility having scientific databases, advanced institutional biotech hub with instrumentation facilities cater to the need of the students and teachers. This is reflected in the number of research publications in peer reviewed journals wherein the students are co-authors. The teachers are encouraged to avail the facilities available to actively undertake Research initiatives involving students. Eminent researchers from across the country are contacted to receive valuable inputs on the specialized area of research through Video Conferencing tools.
- 4. The facility augmented by DBT/DST/UGC/NEC/IITG funding provides an environment to undertake projects by the UG students beyond their prescribed syllabi thereby refreshing the teaching learning capability of the teachers. The hands-on training imparted prepares the Science Graduating Batch with the requisite skill as they progress in PG courses.
- 5. The sponsorship by the different agencies has helped to start with Inter Departmental activities in the college involving more than 3 departments participation.
- 6. The initiation of Skill based programmes like Mushroom cultivation, floriculture, Advanced Analytical Chemistry etc. has augmented the research culture among the interested students. Interdepartmental research projects designed by the faculty as a part of STAR College initiative of DBT, Govt of India for the final semester students have developed the quest for learning among the interested students. Few papers in peer reviewed journal initiated by the students are communicated for publication.
- 7. Institution encourages the faculty to avail leave under FDP programme of UGC. Study leave with Pay are extended to the faculty members for completion of PhD Course Work, during writing and submission of the PhD thesis. The Institution encourages the faculty to interact/deliberate with the faculties of other Institutions for any collaborative work.
- 8. The college propose to establish an Incubation center in the campus to encourage the students in designing a viable project which are self-sustainable and expected to generate Revenue. In this regard the college has already identified Mawjrong, East Khasi Hills to train the locals in various skills such as pisciculture, tailoring, gardening etc.
- 9. The Institution ensures that any Publications/Book Chapter which are to be communicated to Peer reviewed journals are subjected to Test on Plagiarism via DUPLICHECKER, COPYLEAKS, PAPER RATER, PLAGIARISMA etc. (freeware).

- 3 Admission of Students
- 1. The college follows transparent admission policy based on merit, state reservation policy.
- 2. Special preferences are given to economically weaker section, first generation learners, and differently abled learners. A Corpus fund has been set aside to sponsor special category students with their annual fee following fulfilment of laid down norms. The college takes all measures so that the students can avail state and central scholarships by spreading notifications through college website, email etc.
- 3. The prospectus of the college is made available to the students wherein the details of the subject combination, courses offered, fees structure are mentioned. The details of admission criteria, subject combination, fee etc. are made available in the college website. Similarly, all relevant information's regarding admission from UGC and affiliating university are posted on the website.
- 4. Students from outside the state are welcomed and all necessary guidance extended to them during their initial period of stay. The college has informal tie up for PG accommodations with the private parties since there is limited number of seats available in the college hostels (Boys and Girls).
- 5. For any specific query related to the course, the students are encouraged to contact with the concerned department to clear their doubts.
- 6. The college website reflects the academic and physical infrastructure of the institution along with faculty details and information's related to other activities.
- 7. The institution has adopted online method of admission from the present academic session using Management Information System (MIS) linked with the college website. The application forms were made available in the college website and same was received at the college office. All shortlisted candidates were informed via email and payment of fee was through online payment gateways.
- 4 Human Resource Management
- 1. All Academic Administrative decision are approved by the Governing Body of the College. The Policy decisions taken at the level of sponsoring body are implemented at the departmental level through discussions/deliberations among all the stakeholders.
- 2. The college provides the students to express their ideas views in cultural, sports, cocurricular activities by selecting/electing Class Representatives, Animators, Volunteers in various committees. The students are given ample opportunity to formulate a plan in bringing out departmental magazines, Newsletter, College Magazines also during finalisation of study tours/field trips.

- 3. All the members of the staff are covered under (i) Group Insurance Scheme, (ii) EPF/NPS benefits, (iii) Registered Cooperative Society and (iv) Faculty Club. The Faculty Club arranges Annual get together cum picnic for the staff, the Cooperative Society extends soft/emergency loans to the members of the staff.
- 4. All the stakeholders (staff students) can use the GYM and Indoor facility for recreational purposes. The Infirmary with qualified nurse attends to any emergency exigencies.
- 5. The college celebrates Inter Faith and Cross-cultural activities by organizing significant religious cultural festivals for overall development of Character, Personality and Social responsibility among young boys' girls.
- 6. The achievement of the students and the teachers are recognized during Grand Finale of the College month activities by awarding a certificate of appreciation.
- 7. The Institution encourages the staff to monitor/advice and share responsibilities in different extracurricular activities with the students based on their interest passion. Peer support, mentoring and consultations are valued to resolve any issues between different
- 8. The Institution has qualified counsellors to refer students for addressing the queries, possible prospects and suggest easy method to minimize the stress level among the young learners
- 9. The spread of awareness on Gender Equality among all the stakeholders by organising programmes on topic such as vulnerable adults, safeguarding children, substance abuse, etc.
- 10. While the Principal is the academic head of the college the students are well represented through each class representative, who are both responsible and accountable for student related activities. Decisions taken at the highest level has a focus on decentralization. A well thought out feedback mechanism is in place with the availability of grievance redressal mechanism and anti-ragging policies.
- 5 Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure & Instrumentation
- 1. Library equipped with enough books provides a learning platform for the students and teachers. The study materials are supplemented by Journals, Newsletter, Periodicals etc. The library is automated, and e-resources are availed through KOHA, UGCINFLIBNET, British Library (Kolkata) and various others online platforms.

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- 2. All Classrooms are equipped with ICT enabled tools in addition to Chalk duster methodology.
- 3. All Science departments has well maintained Laboratories equipped with enough Instruments/Equipment's/Glassware's/Consumables through Grant received from Central funding agencies in addition to annual Budget allocation by the Institution.
- 4. The Bioinformatics Centre provides ample opportunities to the student's teachers to disseminate information from the available databases. The Laboratory manuals, SOPs, are digitalised for the benefit of the students which can be accessed from the department repository.
- 5. The physical Infrastructure of the college are well maintained by group of dedicated Associated Staff under the able supervision of the management. The views/suggestions of the students and the teachers are taken into consideration during formulating policies and administrative decision for proper implementation. The Swacch initiatives plays a central role in keeping the campus clean-green-litter free along with optimum management of wastewater resources. The college has put in place SOLAR panels for lighting at different vintage points as a part of Energy Conservation Concept. All the stakeholders are provided with safe potable drinking water, hygienic food stuffs at the Canteen which are closely monitored by a designated committee. CCTVs are installed along with deployment of Security personnel to prevent any trespassing in the campus and to cater to the Security of all stakeholders. The college website is the go-to place for acquiring general information on various provision facilities available in the college.
- 6. The high-end Instruments procured through Central funding in the different departments helps to augment teaching learning activities in addition to research projects. The Central Instrumentation Centre facilitates the departments to conduct Practical/Projects beyond the Syllabi.

6 Curriculum Development

Introduction of new add on/value added courses offer students choices. Choice based credit system is available only for PG courses, and in St. Edmund's College, it is only meant for the lone PG course, Master of Social Work (MSW). As a process of Curriculum Development, seminars, panel discussions, workshops, field visits/educational tours et al are always given priority. Workload for the teachers is allotted based on their specialization and aptitude. The Academic Calendar helps focus periodic monitoring of the progress of the syllabus. Attendance of students is an indicator of the performance of the teacher regarding the curriculum dissemination. Contribution of the faculty in curriculum development and syllabus preparation/revision through membership in academic and statutory bodies such as NEHU Academic Council, Board of Studies, and School Board etc is very significant. In St. Edmund's College we consciously try to link curriculum to National Social values through active engagement in outreach/hands-on approach.

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7 Teaching and Learning

Teaching-learning practiced in St. Edmund's College is one of its highlights. It functions smoothly with efficient adherence to timetable/routine a proactive management ever ready to address student- concerns and innovative teaching-learning (LCD, PPT, Online, group activities, project-based studies, emphasis on focusing on learning outcome) methodology. Teachers are encouraged to pursue PhD and handle major/minor research projects. Further, the following steps are taken to ensure a healthy teaching learning environment in the campus:

- Paper publications are encouraged
- Easy access to Informatics Hub
- Wi-Fi enabled vintage locations and Internet facilities in every Department
- Remedial/ tutorial classes for select groups of students
- Group discussions, peer learning, seminars
- Extension and outreach programmes for sharing of knowledge with all stakeholders Summer Schools, Science Melas
- Capacity building for Science Teachers, training in soft skills- outcome-based education to measure progress.
- Use of Dept Central library encouraged industrial visits supplement internships arranged
- Timely tests, assignments, projects, and exams for periodical/continuous evaluation
- Blended mode of teaching using licensed Zoom app, Linways as Learning Management system

Examination and Evaluation

Evaluation happens through various methods both oral and written. Opportunity to improve is provided through counselling teacher-student meetings and transparent marking system. The college maintains a very efficient Examination Cell led by a teacher in-charge and a group of staff from the faculty, administration, and support personnel. The cell takes care of entire process from registration to results.

- 1. Performance of a student are monitored and evaluated through Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) at the departmental level. The Feedback on their performance is shared with the Parents.
- 2. Regular assignments, test. tutorials, seminar presentations, group discussion, viva voce are part of assessment to help the students to check their abilities during teaching learning process.
- 3. The college has very limited role in fixing the dates for the end semester examination, setting of guestion papers and evaluation of the same, However, senior faculty members of the college are directly involved in examination related activities entrusted by the affiliating university. The members of the staff by virtue of being a member of Board of

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Studies (BOS), School Board, Chief Examiner in different subjects takes active role in preparing question papers and evaluating the same in a time bound manner. Involvement of the faculty in such confidential activities helps the university to conduct the examination on time and publish the results within the stipulated time.

- 4. The college takes initiatives to address any examination and evaluation related grievances of the students by directly approaching the appropriate authority of the university.
- 5. The toppers at the University level examination in different courses are honoured during Felicitation Award ceremony for the graduating batch besides, the number of Awards, sponsored by various Alumni and families/organisations are given out to students for Academic as well as overall excellence. The college felicitate the best passing graduate by bestowing the EDMUNDIAN OF THE YEAR AWARD.

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ST.EDMUND'S COLLEGE POLICY FOR STUDENT ADMISSION

- The Core Committee for the Admissions shall consist of Br. R. Noronha (Secretary); Dr S. Lamare (Principal); Mr. M. Chakravarty (Vice Principal); Br. S. Julius (Finance Officer); and Br. S. Coelho (IQAC Coordinator).
- Every HOD will share with the Principal the conditions for admission in their respective departments such as the cut-off mark, subject combination, the special requirements likecompetency in English, Mathematics, etc.
- 3) All data for the Admissions will be Online through LMS portal with provision for the students to pay the Application Fee of Rs 100/- with the help of a voucher generated online. The application number is allotted accordingly.
- 4) The Applicants' data and the application number will be shared with all the HODs, within 24 hours of the Board results being declared and or submission of application form by the prospective candidate willing to take admission. The department shall select/shortlist the candidates for their respective departments in consultation with the Secretary/Principal. The email to be sent by the respective department to the shortlisted candidates and the list to be displayed in the college website.
- Students who have passed class XII science examination shall need to be interviewed by the HOD for suitability to take up Commerce at undergraduate level.
- 6) A notice for admission procedure will be displayed at a suitable place in the campus and also in the college website.

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- 7) The Reservation Policy of 60:40 with respect to state tribal and others shall be followed for the first two lists, after which the admission will be on merit.
- 8) If a student asks for concession/subsidy/instalment option on full payment of fees, they are to pay at least 50% of the prescribed fee or initially a sum of Rs 10,000/- whichever is lower. The rest of the money can be paid within a month of the classes commencing. A correspondence may be sent to the Secretary/Principal in this regard before payment
- 9) The application procedure for Position Holders or with an aggregate of 80% to be fast-tracked for completion of admission procedures.
- 10) The policy for admission to be reviewed before starting of new academic session.



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ST.EDMUND'S COLLEGE POLICY FOR FIELD TRIPS AND STUDY TOURS

- Every effort is made to encourage Field Trips & Study Tours keeping in mind the safety of the students and Teachers.
- 2. The Teacher In-charge with the consent of the HOD will furnish a proposal with the following details
 - (a) Where is the envisaged visit
 - (b) When is the visit to take place
 - (c) What is the student strength (female/male)
 - (d) What is the Staff strength (female/male)
 - (e) What is the cost for the student and the College.
- 3. The Objectives of the Field Trips/Tours should be clearly mentioned.
- 4. A written consent from the students' parents/guardian is a MUST irrespective of the students being above the age of 18.
- 5. While the students are on the Field Trip/Tour the teacher Incharge has to make a DAILY contact with the designated person in the College.
- A detail report of the Field Trip/Tour is to be submitted to the Principal within a week of arrival in the city.
- 7. Foreign Tours are generally discouraged.
- 8. The costing of any of the Field Trip/Tour should be such that it is affordable by all students.
- All bookings and Travel arrangement are to be made only after the Executive Committee clears the Trip/Tour.



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ST.EDMUND'S COLLEGE POLICY FOR GRIEVANCE REDRESSALS

- (a) The St. Edmund's College has six (6) members of the teaching faculty, besides members representing the Management and student community, appointed to serve in the Grievance Redressal Cell. The Cell also includes the Discipline Committee and Anti Ragging Cell of the College. The contact details of the members are uploaded in the college website.
- (b) The grievances redressal cell is chaired by Vice Principal of the college.
- (c) Students and Staff are welcome to submit their grievance online or drop it in a Grievance Box prominently located near the Vice Principal's office.
- (d) One person of the Grievance Cell is responsible for visiting the website and the Grievance Box for concerns shared on a daily basis.
- (e) While the Grievance Cell meets once a month, the meetings may be more frequent to address urgent needs.

- (a) St. Edmund's College has made immense efforts to draw students that are Visually Impaired by advertising especially on the College Website, through word of mouth, especially through exstudents
- (b) The college has a designated teacher to keep in touch with the students to solve any difficulties they may face and to offer them a Contact Person.
- (c) The college has an understanding with the Blind Foundation, Bengaluru to support the students.
- (d) The College has taken the responsibility to procure specially configured Laptops that will make learning student friendly for the Visually Impaired.
- (e) The Vice Principal is assigned to keep in touch with the Visually Impaired students and have at least two meetings with them in a given semester.
- (f) The attendance and the academic progress of all such students and their concerns are given special attention.
- (g) Every effort is made to ensure that the students have the necessary skills to either be gainfully employed or to continue with higher studies.
- (h) All of the above policies are reviewed periodically.

1. Library Books:

- (a) The HOD will consult teachers and some senior students to assess the Library needs of the department.
- (b) List of the required books will be sent to the Principal (Excel format) with details like: Title, Quantity, Price, Location (Central or Department).
- (c) The lists will be shared by the Principal with Executive Committee for approval.
- (d) Once approved the lists will be sent to the Librarian to place the order.
- (e) The purchased books will be given the Bar Code and dispatched to the Central Library or the Department, as the call may be.

2. Lab Equipment's:

- (a) The HOD will submit the lists of consumable and non-consumable items needed for the Laboratory.
- (b) Details that need to be furnished will be: The Items Quantity Price.
- (c) The lists will be shared by the Principal with Executive Committee for approval.
- (d) After the decision is taken by the Executive Committee, the HOD will be requested to go ahead with the order.
- (e) Items once received will be Registered in the Stock Book.

3. Department (Major requirements):

- (a) The HOD will list the department's major requirements (e.g. Computers, Printers, Furniture, etc.) and share them with the Principal.
- (b) Details that need to be furnished will be: The Items Quantity Price.
- (c) The Executive Committee will clear the requirements and arrange for the purchases either directly or through the HOD or through the Rector's office.

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- 4. Department (Frequent Needs):
 - (a) Frequent needs, of the Department, (e.g. Marker pens, Printer refills etc.) will be submitted in the prescribed indent and sent to the Rector's office.
 - (b) If there has been no response within 2 days by the Rector's office the same may be brought to the attention of the Vice Principal.
- 5. External funding:
- (a) The college will follow the prescribed and approved policy of the funding agencies for purchase of any instruments/equipment's/consumable's/hardware/software by constituting a purchase committee having an external member.
- (b) All purchases are to be as per the General Finance Rules (GFR), 2017 with GST invoice and uploading the invoices in PFMS Portal through EAT module.


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ST.EDMUND'S COLLEGE POLICY FOR STUDENT SPONSORSHIP

- (a) Students have to apply to the office of the Rector, St. Edmund's College campus for sponsorship with all relevant documents.
- (b) Tribal students don't get sponsorships if they enjoy Scholarships from Govt.
- (c) Students are interviewed to verify their documents & genuineness of the financial status of the family.
- (d) The current practices is to initially offer a 50% concession/sponsorship for students whose parents are employed in the college as support staff. This percentage is revised based on the students' performance in the semester exams. For subsequent semesters, it would go up to the maximum of 75% depending on the academic performance.
- (e) The students are expected to score at least 45% in their Honours Subject.
- (f) Other economically deserving students are to be referred by the Principal to the Rector office, after assessing the need.
- (g) Each case is judged on its merit at the Executive Committee Level.
- (h) A cheque is issued by the Sponsoring Body for the student to make the payment in the Bank. A receipt of which is to be returned to the Rector's office.

Administration

- 1. Regular meetings between the heads of the department and the principal/management are conducted, the minutes of such meeting are transmitted electronically.
- 2. The minutes of the departmental meeting are sent to the principal/management via electronic mode.
- 3. The minutes of the Executive Committee (EC) and Governing Body (GB) of the college are circulated among the esteemed members through electronically.
- 4. The leave applications, communications to from the staff(s) are done electronically to minimize paperwork.
- 5. The college having dedicated internet service from BSNL, NELINE desires to implement GO GREEN-SAVE TREES in all its future administrative deliberations.
- 6. Online admission process is encouraged to maintain transparencies. The college has current data inputs through AISHE portal, Ministry of Education, Govt. of India. The college maintains an MIS through the Linways Management System (Vendor).

Finance and Accounts

- 1. The college uses Tally ERP (Multiuser) for bookkeeping, PFMS for central funds accounting, SBI Collect for collection of students fee to minimize paperwork and maintain a CASHLESS campus.
- 2. The Internal Audit at the end of each financial year is undertaken by M/s Kiron Joshi Associates, Shillong whereas for State government funds, the Directorate of Local Fund Audit, Govt of Meghalaya does the Audit and place before the college its observations regarding usage of the funds. Majority of the account details are transferred digitally.
- 3. The college being sponsored by CCBI, New Delhi sends all the accounts statement electronically to it headquarter for subsequent audit by Mr S K Mahajan, New Delhi.
- 4. The salary for all the staff of the college is sent through direct bank transfer from designated bank accounts of the college to the individual account holders.
- 5. The fund received under Central Sponsored schemes are audited separately and the audited balance statements are uploaded to PFMS. Any interest accrued on the Central Govt. funding are to be transferred electronically to NTR Portal of Govt. of India.
- 6. The college propose to reduce the paperwork in the accounts section and convert most of the balance sheet in digital format.

Examination

 The internal assessment for the students is carried using LMS services whereby questions for sessional test, assignments, group seminars, feedback are posted which are easily accessible by the students. The students in return send the inputs via the LMS which are then subsequently evaluated.

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
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International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking

Praising the role of NACO and MACS for their continued fight to educate the masses on HIV and end stigmatization, he stressed on the importance of testing and adherence to treatment.

The webinar started at 12am and the Host for the program was Pratiksha Kaushik, she welcomed everyoneto the webinar and talked about Biodiversity and that we should protect and conserve our mother earth, she also mentioned the theme for Biodiversity Day 2021 which was "We Are Part of the Solution #Nature". In order to start with the program a prayer was led by one of the students from the EVS department, the prayer was followed by a welcome speech by Ichha Limbu from EVS department 6th semester. A speech was given by the Principal, Dr. Sylvanus Lamare, he congratulated all the students for preparing and organizing the webinar celebrating Biodiversity Day. After the speech a short clip was presented by the students showing the biodiversity of nature, the clip included photos and videos on nature. An announcement was made the ACR of the 6th semester for the winners of Photography and arts competition organized by the students from the EVS Department.

The resource person of the webinar was Dr. Shivam Shrotriya who is a renowned scientist, and he also has a PhD in Wildlife Science. He started with a presentation that he prepared "The Faunal Diversity in extreme Ecosystems", firstly he asked a question "What do you understand by biodiversity?" and the students answered to the question then he showed two pictures, one was a waterfall and the other was in a city with traffic, here he asked which one is biodiversity and one of the student said both and it was the correct answer. He then talked about how all the species in earth are different from each other and through the interactions among us it creates the ecosystem, a picture was shown about ecology, each and every species has their own roles, most of the species are gone because of connections and every species are dependent on their habitats or ecosystems. The next point was about CaveEcosystem, he showed a cave which is situated in Central India, it is a 600m long chamber

inside. The question was how can biodiversity emerge in caves? One of the student said water but water is not enough and since there are no plants means no photosynthesis. There are actually 10-11 species in the cave and he explained how a bat in a cave eats on insects and they bring the digested food and excrete and that becomes decayed. There are also fishes that survive inside the cave but these fishes and other species have gotten used to the dark nature since in caves it is always dark so most of the species are blinded meaning they lost their eyesight and also color. The next point was the 2nd extinct ecosystem which was Ladakh, the temperature there is very low and is also called the cold desert, the question was raised again that is there a variety of biodiversity in this place but surprisingly there are about 1100 plant species, 319 birds, 36 mammals, 15 Herpetofauna, 370 butterflies and about 3lakh people. Heshowed

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
pictures of many species found in the area, there was a wolf too which is the oldest wolf in the world and it is called the Tibetan or Himalayan wolf. He talked about the major challenges to biodiversity and then ended with the presentation. An interactive session took place where students were asking question to the resource person. One of the teachersthanked the resource person for the incredible presentation. An announcement was again made by the ACR for the winners of the poetry and essay competition. A speech was given by the HOD of EVS department Dr. Jasmine Therese Sawian, she expressed gratitude to the resource person and all the students, the theme inspired to protect the nature and that it is the responsibility of us all to save it. A short quiz took place on biodiversity, after the quiz a vote of thanks was given by one of the students thanking everyone who registered and attended the webinar. The webinar ended at 1:24 p.m.


Assessment:

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World No Tobacco Day

"Commit to Quit"

The host of the webinar is Kanriiaki, the welcome speech was given by the Principal. All the participants took part in taking the pledge. A video was played by Aphisha Kharkongor which was entitled "What is the single best thing you can do to quit smoking".

While watching the video the Principal said in the group chat, "If a smoker spends Rs. 150/- a day, he will spent Rs. 54,750/- a year and Rs2,73,750/- in 5 years, if he quits smoking he could use the money to get something useful for himself and his family."

For the webinar we had a resource person whose name was Dr. Siddarth Banerjee who completed his Bachelor of Dental Surgery from Guru Nanak Institution of Dental Science and Research Kolkata. He was introduced by Primoy Pakyntein.

The resource person first gave his greetings to the participants of the webinar, then he stated that although a lot of us may wish to ban tobacco we must also think about those who produces tobacco and earn their daily bread from this product. Then he went on to ask the as to why it is important to quit tobacco to which he himself answered that we all inherently know that it is bad for our health as well as for the people around us but still a lot of us find it hard to quit.

He first gave a general introduction of tobacco which is a plant which is grown as a cash crop which is then changed into various forms and is used as a material for various use. One such example is Biri which is manufactured in large quantities especially in India and most of the workers in such factories are women and children. People of low income usually consume these as they are cheap. One of the categories of tobacco are flavoured cigarettes, another category is low smoke tobacco (eg:hukka). Another type is smokeless tobacco which is consumed directly without burning the tobacco which people usually put in one side their mouth after which they feel a sense of euphoria. There is also a new form of tobacco which is banned in our country which is called Nicotine Delivery System which uses an electronic method. When we investigate the facts and figures we can see two types of facts and figures one is nationwide, and another is state level. Tobacco in India attributes to 19% total death due to heart disease whereas in Meghalaya it is 27.06%. Smoking affects almost all the parts of our body, smoking causes various types of cancers It also causes a lot of NCDs (Non-Communicable Diseases) like stroke,

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pneumonia etc. Most of the smokers have cavity in their teeth. Smoking also reduces reproductive capacity in both men and women.

How tobacco leads to addiction?

Tobacco consists of a chemical called nicotine. When one smokes nicotine goes into the blood and directly goes to the brain and it attaches itself to the Nicotinic receptors after which aspecific pathway gets activated which is known as the reward pathway after which we feel good because a specific chemical is released called dopamine which results in feelings of euphoria.

Why is it difficult to quit?

After experiencing it for the first time and we feel good then we want to use it more, then when we stop using tobacco the body is starved of nicotine which lowers the level of dopamine which causes the person to feel sad which causes various withdrawal symptoms.

How to overcome the addiction?

We have to develop a plan which must start with a quit date, inform the people around us so that they can support us, anticipating the challenges that is to come, remove all tobacco productsfrom our environment.

Challenges to quitting:

Physical addiction, emotional and psychological connection, behavior and social connection. We can cope with withdrawal symptoms by drinking lots of water and engaging in healthy hobbies, increase appetite and weight gain, focus on positive thoughts, engage in physical activities. One of the most difficult challenges is tackling social and behavior connections which we can do by keeping ourselves positive and being prepared for any kind of relapse. Smoking is a social activity so we should not seize ties with our friends

The benefits of quitting are the blood pressure goes back to normal, the risk of getting a heart attack decreases, nicotine and carbon monoxide levels in our blood reduces, breathing becomes alot easier, chances of getting lung cancer reduces by 30-50%.

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Tobacco causes pleasure but just as much as it gives it also takes up a lot from our lives. Notonly is our health at risk but even the people around us is affected passively. This programme makes us aware of the dangers of tobacco consumption and the healthy ways in which we can overcome the addiction and ways to cope with the withdrawal symptoms. It helps us to come up with a systematic plan to quit.

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
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Conclusion

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Booklet on Code of Professional Ethics for Teachers

CODE OF PROFESSIONAL ETHICS FOR UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE TEACHERS PREAMBLE GOAL OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN OUR COUNTRY: The basic purpose of education is to create skill and knowledge and awareness of our glorious national heritage and the achievements of human civilisation, possessing a basic scientific outlook and commitment to the ideals of patriotism, democracy, secularism, socialism and peace, and the principles enunciated in the Preamble to our constitution. Higher education has to produce leaders of society and economy in all areas of manifold activities with commitment to the aforesaid ideals. Higher education should strive for academic excellence, and progress of arts and science. Education, research and extension should be conducted in conformity with our national needs and priorities and ensure that our best talents make befitting contributions to international endeavour on societal needs. II. TEACHERS AND THEIR RIGHTS: Teachers should enjoy full civic and political rights of our democratic country. Teachers have a right to adequate emoluments, social position, just conditions of service, professional independence and adequate social insurance. THE CODE OF PROFESSIONAL ETHICS TEACHERS AND THEIR RESPONSIBILITIES: Whoever adopts teaching as a profession assumes the obligation to conduct himself in accordance with the ideals

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of the profession. A teacher is constantly under the scrutiny of his students and the society at large. Therefore, every teacher should see that there is no incompatibility between his precepts and practice. The national ideals of education which have already been set forth and which he/she should seek to inculcate among students must be his/her own ideals. The profession further requires that the teachers should be calm, patient and communicative by temperament and amiable in disposition. Teachers should : adhere to a responsible pattern of conduct and demeanour expected of them by the community; manage their private affairs in a manner consistent with the dignity of the profession; (iii) seek to make professional growth continuous through study and research; (iv) express free and frank opinion by participation at professional meetings, seminars, conferences etc. towards the contribution of knowledge; maintain active membership of professional (v) organisations and strive to improve education and profession through them; perform their duties in the form of teaching, tutorial, practical and seminar work conscientiously and with dedication; (vii) co-operate and assist in carrying out functions relating to the educational responsibilities of the college and the university such as: assisting in appraising applications for admission, advising and counselling students as well as assisting in the

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conduct of university and college examinations, including supervision, invigilation and evaluation; (viii) participate in extension, co-curricular and extra curricular activities including community service. TEACHERS AND THE STUDENTS Teachers should respect the right and dignity of the student in (i) expressing his/her opinion; deal justly and impartially with students regardless (ii) of their religion, caste, political, economic, social and physical characteristics; (iii) recognise the difference in aptitude capabilities among students and strive to meet their individual needs; (iv) encourage students to improve their attainments, develop their personalities and at the same time contribute to community welfare; inculcate among students scientific outlook and (v) respect for physical labour and ideals of democracy, patriotism and peace; be affectionate to the students and not behave in a (vi) vindictive manner towards any of them for any reason; (vii) pay attention to only the attainment of the student in the assessment of merit; (viii) make themselves available to the students even beyond their class hours and help and guide students without any remuneration or reward;

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aid students to develop an understanding of our national heritage and national goals and refrain from inciting students against other students, colleagues or administration. III. TEACHERS AND COLLEAGUES Teachers should treat other members of the profession in the same manner as they themselves wish to be treated; speak respectfully of other teachers and render (ii) assistance for professional betterment; (iii) refrain from lodging unsubstantiated allegations against colleagues to higher authorities; refrain from allowing considerations of caste, creed, religion, race or sex in their professional endeavour. IV. TEACHERS AND AUTHORITIES: Teachers should discharge their professional responsibilities (i) according to the existing rules and adhere to procedures and methods consistent with their profession in initiating steps through their own institutional bodies and/or professional organisations for change of any such rule deterimental to the professional interest; refrain from undertaking any other employment and commitment including private tuitions and coaching classes which are likely to interfere with their professional responsibilities; 4

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(iii) co-operate in the formulation of policies of the institution by accepting various offices and discharge responsibilities which such offices may demand: (iv) co-operate through their organisations in the formulation of policies of the other institutions and acept offices; (v) co-operate with the authorities for the betterment of the institutions keeping in view the interest and in conformity with dignity of the profession; should adhere to the conditions of contract; (vi) (vii) give and expect due notice before a change of position is made and (viii) refrain from availing themselves of leave except on unavoidable grounds and as far as practicable with prior intimation, keeping in view their particular responsibility for completion of academic schedule. TEACHERS AND NON-TEACHING STAFF: Teachers should treat the non-teaching staff as colleagues and equal partners in a cooperative undertaking, within every educational institution; Teachers should help in the function of joint staff-(ii) councils covering both teachers and the non-teaching staff. VI. TEACHERS AND GUARDIANS Teachers Should try to see through teachers' bodies and organisations that institutions maintain contact with the quardians of their

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students, send reports of their performance to the guardians whenever necessary and meet the guardians in meetings convened for the purpose for mutual exchange of ideas and for the benefit of the institution. VII. TEACHERS AND SOCIETY Teachers Should recognise that education is a public service and strive to keep the public informed of the educational programmes which are being provided; work to improve education in the community and strengthen the community's moral and intellectual life ; be aware of social problems and take part in such (iii) activities as would be conducive to the progress of society and hence the country as a whole; perform the duties of citizenship, participate in community activities and shoulder responsibilities of public offices; (v) refrain from taking part in or subscribing to or assisting in any way activities which tend to promote feeling of hatred or enemity among different communities, religions or linguistic groups but actively work for National Integration.
