INTRODUCTION

The Department of Social Work-PG, St. Edmund's College, Shillong plans to conduct a small study on the "Impact of COVID 19 on the school-going students of Mawjrong Village" as part of the Concurrent Fieldwork of the 3rd Semester MSW students.

Objective of the study

- 1. To understand the impact of COVID-19 on the normal school system and the teaching-learning of the students and teachers.
- 2. To assess the psychosocial problems of school-going students during COVID-19 pandemic.
- 3. To assess the challenges of the parents to adjust, and provide the support needed for their children's educational requirement during the pandemic.

The First Community Meet with the stakeholders of Mawjrong Village was conducted on 20th November 2021, at 8:00 AM. The *objective of the visit* were: to build rapport with the community leaders; to develop a village profile with the help of the different community stakeholders; to know the village protocol with regard to students visiting the village during the pandemic times; and to assess and discuss with community leaders the feasibility and strategies of student's involvement in the village.

PROFILE OF MAWJRONG VILLAGE

Mawjrong village is located in Khatarshnong Laitkroh Tehsil of East Khasi Hills district in Meghalaya, India. It is situated 6km away from sub-district headquarter Khatarshnong Laitkroh and 5km away from district headquarter Shillong. Mr Lamphrang Diengdoh age 58 is the current headman of this village.



Mawjrong is a Dorbar which falls under the constituency of Sohra. The area of the village is under the Elaka Laitkroh with an agricultural area which falls under Mawkdok, Those are Jaka thangbriew, forest Areas namely Lum Shimet and the Graveyard. There is also a water body named Wah Laitkroh.

A. Anganwadi Center

Ms. Shimtilang Kurkalang is the Anganwadi worker of the Mawjrong Village from 2002. Along with her, the centre also recruited an Anganwadi helper to assist the Anganwadi Worker.



The Center was newly reconstructed and was very child friendly. They have adopted the BALA Concept, where they have made the Building as Learning Aids to sparks interest and a learning environment for the children between 3 to 6 years old.

B. St. Peter Lower Primary School

During the visit, the team had an interaction with two teachers of St. Peter Lower Primary School namely, Mrs Bibimery Lyngdoh and Mrs Ivaline Myrthong. St. Peter L.P School was established in 1977 by the Mission. It was an English medium school. There are 7 teachers in this school, one was under the Government services and the other six were under the mission pay scales. There were approximately 200 students in this school. There were no libraries in the school and the classrooms have only black-boards. No classroom was provided with ICT (Information Communication Technology) tools for learning.



5. Health & Sanitation

There is no health center in the village only traditional healers are there. The households in the village have their own private toilet, but they face water scarcity. The main common health issues within the village were fever/colds, headaches, Stomach Aches, and Diarrhea, etc.

During the interaction with the ASHA (Accredited social health activist), she shared that during this pandemic many of the people are suffering and there are around 167 vaccinated people including the 45 year above and 18 year above. There are still 80% of villagers who are not willing to get vaccinated.



The ASHA (Accredited social health activist) had to provide better services for the people who get infected through this COVID-19 virus. The ASHA (Accredited social health activist) worker also looks after the newborn babies and the pregnant mother, they also provide polio immunization twice in a year that is in the months of January and February.

6. Transportation Facilities:

There were good transport facilities in the village. In the village there is one Bus stand which is located in the main road. The mode of transport that is frequent in the village is by Bus and local Taxi. The villagers also visit nearby towns because of their health problems, or pursuing higher studies as well as for earning.

7. Other Facilities:

The community Hall is available within the village as well as the streetlight. The village did not have a sports facility ground, NGO, Police station, Post office nor a training canter within the village. There is a residential training center which was constructed by the Christian Brothers.
